The greater part of T.36 N., R.31 E.is rolling and rough mountainous, with a small valley draining from sec.6 thru to secs. 32, 33 and 34.

The soil of this valley, as well as that of the other principal valleys and draws, consists of deep fine alluvial sand with clay and gravel subsoil. The hills in the SE. are made up of slate rock, with a limestone ridge in secs. 26 and 27. Most of the other hills and mountains are made up of trap rock, with several lava ridges in the western part of the township.

The hills have a scattering growth of scrub juniper.

The undergrowth consists of sage and shadscale. The grass has been pastured off by sheep.

The only water in the township is a spring in the NE. \(\frac{1}{4} \)

NE. \(\frac{1}{4} \) of sec. 20. that is claimed by Willis W. Wells. His improvements consist of a house, barn, garage, and other buildings, and approximately two acres of irrigated alfalfa and garden land fenced. There are no other settlers in the townships

There is a road leading from the Red Butte Mines in the township to the North, thru from sec.6 to sec.34 with branches leading to Antelope and Sulphur. A road from Wells'Ranch leads eastward to the Black Diamond Mine and the Hummel Ranch.

There are few indications of valuable minerals in the township.
