Subdivision of T. 7 S., R. 67 E.

Chains.

Land; steep and rough mountainous, draining SE.
Soil; rocky, red sand, very shallow on ridges and spurs;
but varies from a few ins. to 1 ft. deep in the bottoms
of ravines and canyons.
Timber; varies from a scattering to heavy growth of cedar
and pinon pine.
Undergrowth; patches of dense oak brush and manzanita,
scattering sagebrush, black brush and service-berry
bushes.
Formation; outcroppings of volcanic boulders, broken led-
ges and slide-rock.
Exposure; NE. and SW.
Very little grass.

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From the cor. of secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36, on the S. bdy.
of the Tp., which is an iron post, 3 ins. dia., 12 ins.
above ground, firmly set, and marked and witnessed as
described by the surveyor general,
N.0°01'W. bet. secs. 35 and 36.

black brush, scattering oose, cactus and mountain rush;

- 9.70 Top of spur, 130 ft. above sec. cor., projects NE.; desc.
 - 17.80 Foot of descent, 265 ft. below top of spur, bears NE.

 - 18.40 Dry wash, 80 lks. wide, 2 ft. deep, course SW.
 - 20.50 Begin abrupt ascent over broken ledges, bearing NE. and
