

General Description of T. 18 N., R. 62 E.

The land in this township consists of rough, broken mountains covered, in the Northeastern and central portion, with a heavy growth of pine and juniper. There is a small valley running thru the township, from the north boundary of sec. 3, diagonal across the township to the East bdy. of sec. 36, but there is no agricultural land of any value, except, probably thru sections 25 and 36, which is a good volcanic ash, suitable for raising crops, but there is no water available for irrigation. Several settlers have attempted to farm the land, but have given it up, for some reason or other.

There are two settlers in the township at the present time. Mrs. Alice McManus has a claim in sec. 3, which is producing hay and vegetables enough to subsist her family and stock. Mr. Lee Jones has a claim in sec. 15, from which he cuts a small quantity of hay, and raises quite a few vegetables.

There are about twenty springs in the township, which are confined mostly to the NW. quarter. There is no water in the southern half.

There are no indications of mineral in the township.
