The original cor. of secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36, on S. Bdy. of T. 13 N., R. 28 E., I find to be a redwood post, 14 ins. above the ground,  $4\frac{1}{2}$  ins sq., firmly set, and markings nearly obliterated. Therefore alongside Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. dia., 24 ins. in the ground, for cor. of secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36, with brass cap mkd.

and raise a mound of stone, 2 ft. base,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  ft. high, W. of cor.

Thence

East, on a true line, bet. secs. 1 and 36.

Over nearly level bench land, through scattering undergrowth.

8.20 Main road, from Schurz, to Walker Lake, bears N. 20° W., and S. 20° E.

19.00 Head of dry wash, course NE.

22.40 Road, bears NW. and SE.

27.50 Leave bench land, bears N. 20° W. and S. 20° E., desc. 50 ft. over abrupt bluff.

28.80 Dry ditch, 8 lks. wide, 2 ft. deep, course S. 20° E.,

30.00 Base of bluff, enter nearly level bottom land, bears N. 20° W. and S. 20° E.

Enter cottonwood timber and willows, bears N. 20° W., and S. 20° E.

39.91 Intersect the original  $\frac{1}{4}$  cor. of secs. 1 and 36, which I find to be a greatly decayed post, with marks almost obliterated. Alongside this cor.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. dia., 26 ins. in the ground, for  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor., with brass cap mkd.
