## General Description.

This township contains nearly every variety of land, from barren level desert to rough mountainous. The extreme NE. portion of this township is of a very rough mountainous, broken and choppy character. Mineral indications were observed in this portion. The soil is very shallow and is a light sandy loam, mixed with lava rock, and is further covered with a fair growth of grass and dense undergrowth. The remaining portion of this township is rolling, hilly, and level and in many places shifting sand forms low sand ridges. The soil in this section ranges from fine medium texture loam to fine sand and coarse gravel, and is very alkali. All of this section is covered with a light growth of grass and a dense growth of principally sagebrush, greasewood, shadscale and rabbitbrush. All water courses drain into a dry barren alkali lake bed situated in sec. 24. Some years ago borax was extracted from this lake.

There are two small alkali springs locally named

Double Springs located in the NE. 1 NW. 1 of sec. 25; also
a small frame house owned by the Indian Service is located
in the same NE. 1 NW 1 of sec. 25.

A main road from Deadhorse Well to Schurz by way of Double Springs traverses in an east and west direction.

Another main road traverses the township in a northeasterly and southwesterly direction from Schurz to Rawhide.
