Special Agent Doyle, in his report to the Honorable Commissioner, General Land Office, dated June 18,1918 reports the finding of the following corners for Sec. 1. T. 31 N. R. 33 E., and which are indicated on blue print No. 1 in the supplemental diagram of Sec. 1 by red circles; the north-west and north-east closing corners, the south-east section corner, and a stone marked for the cor, of secs. 6 and 7, T. 31 N., R. 34 E. on the east bdy. of sec. 1 and a stone marked for the east $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 1. In addition to the above corners, I found a second set of corners at the north-east and south-east corners of sec. 1, also a double set of corners along the north bdy. of sec. 1. East of the stone marked for the east 4 sec. cor. of sec. 1, a distance of 15.93 chains, I found a stone properly marked and firmly set for the \frac{1}{4} sec. cor. of secs. 6 and 7, T. 31 N., R. 34 E. Its position in relation to the stone marked for the cor. of secs. 6 and 7 is clearly indicated on the supplemental diagram.

Corners established or restored by different surveyors are indicated by dates in black ink as follows;

A description of original corners follow:

T. 32 N., R. 33 E. Seventh Standard Parallel.

Std. \(\frac{1}{4} \) Sec. 31. Fragment of old willow stake, 12 ins. in length, one side surfaced, no scribe marks visible Std. cor. of secs. 31 and 32. Fragment of old willow stake, 10 ins. in length, squared edges, no scribe marks discernible. No positive evidence of mound.

Std. cor. of secs. 32 and 33. Old willow stake, 15 ins. in length, squared edges, no scribe marks visible, corner lying on distinct mound of earth.
