

General Description.

Secs. 6, 7, 18, 19, 30 and 31 of this township is rough mountainous land, with numerous outcroppings of quartzite and sandstone formation. These sections are covered with a dense growth of pinion pine, cedar and mountain mahogany, and scattering sage. Secs. 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 16, 17, 20, 21, 28, 29, 32 and 33 is rolling mountainous and rough mountainous land, with heavy and medium growth of pinion pine and cedar, and medium growth of shadscale and sage. The remainder of the township is nearly level land, covered with medium growth of shadscale and scant growth of grass.

Lexington creek flows through secs. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6. This stream affords a limited amount of water for irrigation purposes for two small ranches, one in secs. 4 and 5, and the other in secs. 5 and 6.

The township is valuable chiefly for grazing purposes, and affords fairly good winter range for sheep.

There are no indications of mineral in this township.
