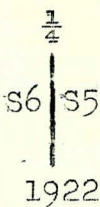


SURVEY OF SUBDIVISIONS OF T. 23 N., R. 45 E.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The major portion of the lands in this township are rough mountainous to rolling mountainous in character. All of sections 6, 7 and 18 and parts of sections 5, 8, 17 and 19 are level to gently rolling. Practically the entire areas of sections 5, 6, 7 and 18 could be rendered arable, if sufficient water could be obtained for irrigation purposes. The land in S½ of SE¼ of section 5, settled by Michael Cadet, is the only cultivated area in the entire township. He has a small productive garden, and alfalfa fields with a total acreage of about 35 acres, all of which is subject to irrigation. The uplands of the township are suitable only for grazing, there being no timber of commercial value.

The soil in the lowlands is generally a coarse sandy loam, while that of the highlands is rocky with an
