GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The major portions of sections 1, 12, 13, 14, 15, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 32, 33, 34, 35 and 36, are rough mountainous in character. These sections lying within the Simpson Park Range, a chain of mountains of very rugged and precipitous nature in the higher altitudes. The other sections of the township lie most in rolling and bench land, there being small areas of practically level land.

The fall in all canyons is great, and the sides of water courses in the higher areas are very steep.

A coarse loam with fragmentary rock is prevalent in the higher altitudes. It becomes a clay gravelly loam as the lower levels are reached.

In the northeast portion is found a scattering stand of pinon and juniper, but of too dwarfed a nature to be of
