GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The greater part of sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35 and 36 are rough mountainous in character. The Simpson Park Range of mountains, rugged in the extreme, lying within the southeast portion of the township. The remainder of the township is located in low lying hills along the western base of the mountains, extending to the rolling desert land in the extreme northwest portion. The higher sections of the mountains are very rough, with many ledges and precipitous slides. In the higher elevations the ravines have steep, rocky sides. The fall in all the canyons is great. The soil in the highlands is a coarse loam, with an intermixture of fragmentary rock. In the lowlands it becomes a clay loam, with areas of a gravelly texture. In the mountainous areas are found heavy stands of dwarfed pinon and juniper, in sufficient quantities for domestic purposes. Occasional dense thickets of mountain mahogany prevail in the higher portions. So far as can be learned, no mineral of a commercial value, has been found in the township. There are numerous running streams of good water, as well as many springs of mountain origin. This entire township ranges several thousand sheep and approximately 1000 cattle during the open seasons, there being a fair amount of grasses and an abundance of water for grazing purposes.
