General Description.

The boundary of this township lies on the E. slope of the Antelope range of mountains. The land is rolling mountainous and rough mountainous, covered with a scattering growth of cedar and pinon pine timber. The soil is a light clay loam of medium texture, very rocky. There is a medium growth of black sage, shadscale and bunch grass along the entire line. The general drainage is east to Antelope Valley.

Surface indications of mineral were observed on the E. Bdy. of sec. 25, T. 24 N., R. 67 E.

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
