

## General Description.

The land in this township, except the extreme eastern portion, which lies in the Antelope valley, is rolling and rough mountainous, and is covered with a medium to dense growth of pinon pine and cedar timber, and on the higher slopes with a scattering growth of mahogany. The entire township is covered with a medium growth of sage, shadscale and bunch grass, which affords excellent summer grazing land, The soil is generally a rocky clay loam of medium texture, capable of producing excellent crops with irrigation.

Chin creek traverses the township in a N.easterly direction, with running water through secs. 23, 24, 26 and 27. A part of the waters of this stream are being utilized in secs. 24 and 26 for irrigation purposes. North creek traverses the township in a N. westerly direction, with running water through secs. 19, 30, 31 and 32. Stockade springs in sec. 4 furnishes a limited amount of water for irrigation purposes.

There were two settlers residing in the township at the time of this survey; F.A.Raabe in sec. 24 and B.D.Magee in sec. 4.

No indications of mineral were observed in the township.
