General description, T. 25 N., R. 45 E.

The land in this township descends from mountainous land in the eastern portion to slightly rolling land in the central and western portions. The extreme eastern portion of the township is covered with juniper timber. The soil is a light, sandy, gravelly and rocky clay. The undergrowth consists of sage and shadscale, with sage predominating on the higher land, and shadscale on the lower land. The higher land within the township is covered with a fair growth of grass, and the lower land with a scant growth of grass. The township is valuable, chiefly, as grazing land.

There is approximately, 100 acres of native hay meadow situated in secs 6 and 7, which is irrigated, seasonally, by the flood waters from Hall Creek.

There is a small seasonalflow of water in the N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  of sec. 2, and a small spring located in the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ ; SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of sec. 1, which flows a greater portion of the year.

The main Austin-Beowawe road traverses the township in a northeasterly and southwesterly direction through sec. 6.

No mineral indications were observed within the township.
