General description of fractional T. 24 N.; R. 48½ E.

The entire area surveyed in this fractional township is rolling or rolling mountainous land suitable only for grazing purposes. The northern portion of the township is covered with a very scattering growth of juniper; a scattering to medium growth of juniper and pinon pine in the central portion and a very scattering growth of juniper in the southern portion. The undergrowth consists of a medium growth of sage, scattering growth of buck brush and a fair growth of grass over the entire area of the township.

The soil is a gravelly and rocky clay of medium texture.

No settlers were residing in the township at the time of this survey.

No mineral indications were observed.

There is only one road leading into the township, which traverses the township in a northwesterly and southeasterly direction through sections 25 and 36. This road connects with the main Austin road about eight miles northwest and leads to Eureka to the south, a distance of approximately sixty miles. This road is a main traveled one through this section of the country.
