

GENERAL DESCRIPTION, T.39 N.,R.48 E.

The lands embraced within this township are chiefly low rolling hills, with some level land along Willow and Rock Creeks. The extreme southern portion of the township lies on the N. slope of a high ridge extending in an easterly and westerly direction. The slopes of this portion, while steep and rocky, are covered with considerable vegetation in the form of sagebrush and native grasses which affords good grazing and browse for sheep or cattle.

Willow Creek provides the main drainage for the south, east, and central portions of the township and Rock Creek drains the northwestern portion. The area between these creeks consists of low rolling hills, bench or mesa lands with uniform gravelly to rocky slopes covered with a fair growth of sagebrush, yellow top and bunch grass. This area, while unsuited for cultivation provides fair grazing in the spring and early summer months.

Small parcels of bottom lands along Willow Creek are suitable for cultivation and would produce crops with the aid of irrigation. Some of this area in secs. 28, 30, and 31 have been cultivated but at the time of this resurvey were abandoned.

Willow Creek Reservoir is located in secs. 26, 27, 34, 35 and 36 and provides storage water for summer irrigation of lands in Squaw Valley about 12 miles to the west. A good spring- the only spring suitable for stock watering purposes- is located in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 33. Small seep springs are also located in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 29 and in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. 28.

The main Tuscarora-Midas highway parallels Willow Creek through the southern portion of the township, and a dim road runs through secs. 27, 23, and a portion of sec. 14
