

General Description of T. 35 N., R. 18 E.

The portion of this township under survey is generally rolling mountainous land affording good grazing but wholly unsuited for farming purposes. The soil is a heavy clay or adobe, very rocky, and generally strewn with much surface rock of volcanic origin. The predominate undergrowth is sage, with a medium to dense growth of buckbrush and deer browse. There is an excellent growth of grass over the entire area. The whole of the township is covered with a scattering to medium growth of juniper, and mahogany in dense clumps along the spurs and ridges. The only practical use for this timber is for fuel or fence posts.

There is a good spring located in section 29, which is the only one within the area surveyed. However, this spring, together with others located on contiguous land afford sufficient water for all stock that can be grazed in this section.

There were no settlers residing within the township at the time of survey. No mineral indications were observed.

The township is not accessible from the north and east except by pack train. A road from the south, leading into Nevada from the California side of the line, which is seldom used and in a poor state of repair, leads to the south boundary of section 32 of the township.

The applicant for survey, Joe Aspilche had abandoned his holdings at the time of survey. Applicant's stone house, in a dilapidated condition, is about 5 chs. NE. of the spring.
