General Description of T. 13 N., R. 61 E.

This township is slightly rolling land covered with a scattering to medium growth of juniper timber in the north, west and central portions. The soil, generally, is a light, sandy, gravelly and rocky clay loam of medium texture, six to thirty inches in depth, over a solid and rocky clay subsoil.

The undergrowth predominating is shadscale, with a dense growth of black sage along the bottom of washes, and, with a scattering growth of grass over the entire township.

Except a hay meadow located in the SE. $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 30, comprising approximately twenty acres, the land is valuable, chiefly, for grazing purposes. The soil would produce an abundant growth of good grass if it were not overstocked.

There is a small spring located in sec. 17 which is fitted with a trough for stock watering purposes. White River traverses secs. 29 and 30 in an easterly direction. This stream contains running water throughout the year, which is utilized for irrigation purposes in the adjoining townships.
