

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

This boundary line of Ts. 19 N., Rs. 68 and 69 E., passes over four miles of high, rough mountain land, in the south, draining to the east and north-east, and two miles of rolling foot hill land, draining to the west and north-west.

On the high mountain land may be found a medium and scattered growth of mahogany, pinon pine and juniper, and on the rolling foot hills will be found scattered clumps of medium dense pinon pine and juniper.

The soil is all of a limestone formation of gravelly clay loam, medium fine in texture on the foot hills, but of a courser texture on the high mountain land.

As a whole the soil may be termed as third rate.

A scattered growth of sagebrush and native grasses cover the mountain land, while a medium growth of white sage, sagebrush, shadscale and native grasses cover the foot hills.

There were no settlers living on land adjacent to this line.

No signs of coal, oil, or gas were found, but the land is slightly mineralized.

No magnetic declinations were taken because of a defective needle in the instrument.
