General Description

The area within T. 32 N., R. 68 E., is a mountainous area bisected by the Toana Range, varying from approximately 6000 ft. to 8000 ft. above sea level. The eastern portion is about eleven miles SW. of Wendover, Utah, and the western portion about 10 miles SE. of Shafter, Nevada, the nearest postoffice.

There is a good stand of native grasses and shrubs which furnishes good grazing for cattle. Springs of sufficient flow for stock watering purposes are located in sections 14, 15, 22, 24, 26 and just north of the boundary of sec. 2, all on the east slope of the Toana Range. There is no water within the township on the west slope of the range.

There are no permanent habitations within the township. A cabin and evidence of mineral activity are located in sec. 6, and a cabin in sec. 14.

A good stand of juniper and pinon timber within the township is of value for firewood and fence posts. The few stands of fir timber are too small and too inaccessible to be of commercial value.
