

GENERAL DESCRIPTION, T. 22 S., R. 63 E.

This township lies principally on the west slope of a rugged range of mountains that terminate in a broad gently sloping flood plain draining in a general west and northwest direction. The extreme east portion and part of the northeast portion of the township, lie on these rugged, barren, rocky slopes.

The soil in the mountainous land is very shallow gravelly and rocky, while that in the flood plain is a coarse deep gravel and rock, and may be classified as third rate. The soil in the mountainous land is insufficient for the growth of very little vegetation.

In the flood plains, a medium dense short undergrowth of shadscale, chaparral, creosote, sagebrush, and cacti was found.

The Boulder City branch of the Union Pacific Railroad, enters the township on the W. bdy. of section 18, and bears in a southeasterly direction to Boulder City, leaving the township on the S. boundary of section 34. A new State Highway from Las Vegas, which highway was under construction, enters the township on the west boundary of section 7, and bears in a southeasterly direction, to Boulder City, leaving the township on the south boundary of section 35. A telephone line from Las Vegas, enters the township on the W. boundary of section 6, and bears in a southeasterly direction to Boulder City, leaving the township on the east boundary of section 24. The old highway from Las Vegas to Searchlight, enters the township on the west boundary of section 6, and bears in a southeasterly direction, leaving the township on the south boundary of section 32. Numerous other old roads were found throughout most portions of the township.

There is no water in any portion of the township.

Numerous prospect holes were found, but no indications of any minerals were found in place.

The magnetic declination was not taken.

At the time of this survey, no settlers were living within the boundaries of this township, and no portion of it was under cultivation.
