GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township is mostly rugged mountainous land which is covered with a medium dense to dense growth of juniper, nut pine and mahogany. The undergrowth is generally big sage and bunch grass and this area may be considered fair to good grazing land. The scarcity of water is the main hindrance to the grazing. There are two intermittent streams, one in the extreme western part of the township and one in the eastern side. These streams flow hardly at all during the hot and dry summer months, but the water springs up in a few places sufficient for the watering of some sheep and numerous wild horses which graze here all year round.
