## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands of this township vary from high rolling plains to rough, broken mountainous lands; the average elevation is about 6000 feet. The soil varies from a fine wind-blown sand to coarse gravelly loam on the lower slopes and from a gravelly clay loam to a coarse rocky loam on the higher slopes. None of the lands are tillable and the only agricultural use is for limited grazing purposes during seasons of average rainfall. There are no streams or springs in the township.

Some mining activity in Section 18 had been started about 20 years ago; a number of claims were located and much surface work was done but no commercial ore deposits appear to have been developed. No other indications of minerals or of mining activities were noted in the township.

An unimproved road from Rand (a station on the Southern Pacific railroad on the east shore of Walker Lake) to the mining camp of Rawhide, Nevada, cuts diagonally through the southeast corner of the township. A branch road runs southerly to Hawthorne, Nevada, which is the nearest post office and supply point; it is about 20 miles distant.

The magnetic declination was not recorded due to a sluggish and inaccurate needle.
