GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The elevation of the east half of this township ranges from about 4,400 above sea level in the lowest point near the northwest corner to about 5,500 ft. above sea level along a portion of the south boundary and in the extreme southeastern and northeastern corners. The lands along the south boundary, together with those in the southeastern and northeastern portions are mountainous in character and the drainage is northerly, northwesterly and southwesterly respectively. All drainage eventually is in a general northwest direction toward a dry lake bed, situated a few miles northwest of the north boundary.

The soil in the lower regions varies from a fine wind blown sand to a medium fine gravel. The soil changes from a sandy and gravelly type to a rocky soil in the foothills and is a very shallow rocky soil in the broken mountainous area. Stunted undergrowth indicates a low humus content. There is no timber in the township. The whole of the surveyed area has a medium dense covering of greasewood and shadscale along with a fair covering of native grasses and plants, while in the foothills and mountains a fairly heavy growth of native grasses are found.

No water was found in the township. For this reason, grazing - which appears to be the only suitable industry
