## Chains

At midpoint on the N. bdy. of sec. 5.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 27 ins. in the ground, for  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 5, with brass cap mkd.

A juniper, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 75° E., 30 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S5 BT.

A pinon pine, 4 ins. diam., bears S. 20° W., 41 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S5 BT.

The  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 32, T. 12 N., R. 59 E., bears East, 4.81 chs. dist.

At a point, on the N. bdy. of sec. 6, which is 40.00 chs. West, from the closing cor. of secs. 5 and 6 on the N. bdy. of Tp.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 12 ins. in the ground to bedrock and in a mound of stone to top, for  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 6, with brass cap mkd.

A pinon pine, 8 ins. diam., bears S. 67° E., 52 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S6 BT.

A pinon pine, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 69° W., 42 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S6 BT.

The  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 31, T. 12 N., R. 59 E., bears East, 4.88 chs. dist.

## General Description

The land within the township varies from mountainous to rolling mountainous and rolling, and has an approximate elevation from 6000 to 9500 feet above sea level. The character of the terrain is quite scenic; and is rugged, very choppy, broken and rocky. The soil is shallow sand and gravel on underlying limestone and porphyry base. Many ridges and spurs, spread fan like with bulging porphyry crags, while others appear reef like, formed by tilted limestone forming spire like crags and vertical cliffs and ledges, with steep varied colored talus slopes. A high divide ridge crosses the township, entering in sec. 3, winding irregularly  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles southeasterly, thence nearly south for about one mile to Carrant Summit. At this pass the U.S. Highway No. 6 crosses this ridge, Horse Range. The ridge extends about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile, thence winds irregularly southwesterly for  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles and thence southerly, leaving the township at the S. bdy. of sec. 33.

The drainage is very good, with one large wash and its numerous tributaries covering nearly the whole SE $\frac{1}{4}$ . The extreme NE. area in secs. 1, 2, and 12 have several large washes draining easterly. The remainder of the area is drained by the Carrant Creek system.
