

## Survey of a Portion of the Subdivision of T. 16 N., R. 68 E.

Chains

The true point for the cor., which falls on face of cliff facing NE., bears North, 1.50 chs. dist.

Desc. 490 ft. over steep broken NE. and N. slopes, over cliffs and rocks, to N. bdy. of the township.

True point for the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 4, at proportionate distance, based on an assigned basic length of 80.04 chs. (equal to the original length of the W. bdy. of sec. 4) in order to protect the old surveyed area comprising the W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  of sec. 4.

Intersect the S. bdy. of sec. 33, T. 17 N., R. 68 E. at point for the closing cor. of secs. 3 and 4, T. 16 N., R. 68 E., on the N. bdy. of the township.

Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 2 ins. diam., 6 ins. in the ground, to bedrock, and in a mound of stone to top, with brass cap mkd.

A juniper, 14 ins. diam., bears S.  $86^{\circ}$  W., 127 lks. dist., mkd. T16N R68E S4 CC BT.

No other bearing tree available.

From this cor., the cor. of secs. 33 and 34, T. 17 N., R. 68 E., which is monumented with an iron post, 2 ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the official record of the 1920 resurvey and survey of the S. bdy. of T. 17 N., R. 68 E., bears S.  $89^{\circ} 57'$  E., 2.03 chs. dist.

From this same cor., the S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of sec. 33, T. 17 N., R. 68 E., bears N.  $89^{\circ} 57'$  W., 38.00 chs. dist.

Land, rough mountainous.

Soil, part gravelly, part rocky clay.

Timber, pinon and juniper; undergrowth, sagebrush and rabbit brush.

## General Description

Township 16 North, Range 68 East is situated about 60 miles southeast of Ely and about 18 miles northwest of Baker, Nevada.

The land is generally rough mountainous; the soil, where tillable, is a gravelly clay. Timber consists of a dense non-commercial pinon and juniper, with an undergrowth of sagebrush and greasewood.

Grazing varies from fair to poor; agriculture, poor.

The township is drained by Nigger Creek, 10 lks. wide, 12 ins. deep, flowing in a southwesterly direction. Its water is good for human and cattle consumption.

There is one settler, Arthur Yelland, located in section 17.
