Chains	Retracement and Partial Dependent Resurvey of the Survey Executed by L. G. B. McDowell, Deputy Surveyor, in 1904.
	<p>Beginning at the original $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 6, on the W. bdy. of T. 27 N., R. 57 E., which is monumented with a quartzite stone, 20x8x4 ins., set in a fallen mound of stone, marked and witnessed as described in the official record. We repair and enlarge the surrounding mound of stone and the witness mound of stone W. of the corner.</p> <p>This corner is situated on top of an outcropping, near the crest of a spur ridge projecting easterly from the top of Rattlesnake Peak, which lies about 10 chs. to the W. in section 1.</p> <p>N. 0° 27' E., bet. secs. 1 and 6.</p> <p>Over rough mountainous land, through scattering timber and dense undergrowth; desc. 1100 ft. over NE. and N. slopes over broken cliffs, ledges and slide rock areas.</p>
35.70	<p>Point for the closing cor. of Ts. 27 and 28 N., R. 57 E., described in the field notes of the survey of the S. bdy. of T. 28 N., R. 57 E., executed concurrently under the same survey Group.</p> <p>Continue line and measurement, but now, bet. sec. 1 of T. 27 N., R. 56 E. and sec. 31 of T. 28 N., R. 57 E.</p>
37.50	(Approx. dist.) Brown Creek, with running water, 5 lks. wide, 4 ins. deep, course N. 75° W.
38.20	(Approx. dist.) Forest Service trail, bears N. 75° W. and S. 75° E.
38.88	<p>Intersect the N. bdy. of the township, on the S. bdy. of sec. 36, T. 28 N., R. 56 E., at proportionate point for closing cor. at NE. cor. of sec. 1, T. 27 N., R. 56 E.; there is no remaining evidence of the original closing cor. Corner not reestablished.</p> <p>From point for closing cor., the original cor. at SE. cor. of sec. 36, T. 28 N., R. 56 E., bears S. 89° 57' E., 5.25 chs. dist., described in the field notes of the Dependent Resurvey of a portion of the S. bdy. of T. 28 N., R. 56 E., executed concurrently under the same survey Group.</p> <p>Land, rough broken mountainous. Soil, mostly rocky. Timber, scattering juniper, pinon and mahogany; undergrowth, sagebrush, blackbrush and rabbit brush.</p>
<p>General Description</p> <p>The east boundary of the township lies along the east foot of the Ruby Mountains, along the west side of Ruby Lake.</p> <p>The area generally has a covering of scattered juniper, cedar and mahogany, with dense undergrowth of sagebrush, blackbrush and a good growth of native grasses, making the area valuable for grazing purposes.</p> <p>The west boundary of the township lies along the rocky west slopes of the Ruby Mountains, but affords some good grazing lands on the benches and less steep hillsides.</p>
