

Dependent Resurvey, Portion of the South Boundary, T. 28 N., R. 56 E.

	S. 89° 57' E., beginning new measurement.
	Desc. 70 ft. along a broken and very rocky brushy N. slope.
20.90	Steep gulch, course N.; asc. 25 ft. over a NW. slope.
24.30	Point of spur, slopes N.; desc. 30 ft. over a NE. slope.
30.60	Brown Creek, a flowing stream, 5 lks. wide, 3 ins. deep, course N. 80° W.; asc. 140 ft. along a broken S. slope, through dense aspen and brush, to the township corner.
33.65	Forest Service trail, bears N. 80° W. and S. 80° E.

Land, rough mountainous.

Soil, sandy gravel and very rocky with considerable slide rock. Timber, aspen, mahogany and a few pinon and juniper interspersed; undergrowth, sagebrush, buckbrush, laurel, willow, aspen and many other varieties of brush and shrubs, and a fair growth of grass.

Note: In T. 28 N., R. 56 E. the following subdivisional lines were retraced and diligent search made at record positions for evidence of the original corners, viz. lines between secs. 1-2, 11-12, 13-14, 23-24, 25-26, 35-36, 26-35, 34-35, 27-34, $W\frac{1}{2}$ 1-12 and $E\frac{1}{2}$ 28-33. The only corners found are shown in the foregoing field notes.

General Description

This township lies in Huntington Valley, along the west foot of the Ruby Mountains.

State Highway No. 46, leading to Jiggs, Nevada in the northern portion of T. 29 N., R. 56 E., crosses the township in a north and south direction.

Practically the entire area supports a good stand of native grasses as well as various shrubs and bushes affording soil protection and coverage as well as brouse feed for stock.

Several creeks come into the township from the high mountains to the east, furnishing water for stock and hay field irrigation.

Several large stock and hay ranches are situated in this township. Probably the better known of these are the Brown Ranch, the G. E. Arnold Ranch, the Max Arnold Ranch and the Sestanovich Ranch.
