Timber, juniper, pinon and mahogany; undergrowth, sagebrush and a fair growth of grass.

General Description

Most of the township is mountainous in character. The main ridge of the Ruby Mountains crosses the township in the general north-south direction from section 34 on the south boundary to section 1 on the north boundary. Elevations over the township vary from about 6300 feet at the east and west boundaries to about 9300 ft. on the south boundary where the main ridge of the Ruby Mountains enters the township.

The crest of the main Ruby Mountain ridge breaks down to an elevation of 7248 feet at Harrison Pass, situated about one mile west of the east boundary and one mile south of the north boundary of the township. An east-west road crosses the township, passing through this pass, leading from Ruby Valley on the east and following down Toyn Creek from the pass to the northwest corner of the township, thence northwest along Corral Creek valley to Jiggs, Nevada.

Four fair-sized creeks head in this township and flow generally to the west, furnishing stock and irrigation water to farms in Huntington Valley to the west. Toyn Creek drains the northern part of the township, Corral and Pearl Creeks drain the central portion, and Brown Creek flows west along the west three miles of the south boundary.

Practically the entire township furnishes excellent summer grazing.
