

SUBDIVISION OF T. 29 N., R. 26 E.

Land, nearly level.
 Soil, sandy clay loam, 3rd to 4th rate.
 Undergrowth, fair to good.
 Grazing, fair to good.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The southeastern portion of this township is cut transversely by a rugged lava ridge, the crests of which have an elevation of about 6500 ft. The western slopes break sharply toward a dry lake bed or playa which has an elevation of about 3950 feet. The southeastern slopes are more rolling and are cut by numerous rocky ravines draining in a general southerly direction. The above playa has an area of approximately 5700 acres and covers portions of sections 2, 8, 9, 10, 11, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 28, 29 and 30. There is no vegetation on this lake bed.

On the gently rolling slopes NE., N. and SW. of the lake bed, a medium dense undergrowth of shadscale, rabbit brush, sagebrush, greasewood and a few isolated areas of a dense white sage are found. This latter shrub affords excellent winter grazing for sheep.

The only water in the township is at two small seepage springs situated in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$ and NW $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 13. The flow from these seepages is not adequate for stock watering purposes; the water was tested and found to be pure and of good quality.

There is no timber in the entire township.

One road, which can be used only during dry weather, crosses the lake bed in a general N. and S. direction thru the western half of the township. Another road, very dim and infrequently used, runs in a general E. and W. direction across the northern portion of the township. These roads are unimproved and difficult of travel for automobiles at any time of the year and are impassable during the wet seasons.
