

Survey of the North Boundary of T. 8 S., R. 62 E.

Chains

From this corner, the reestablished cor. of Ts. 7 and 8 S., R. 61 E., hereinbefore described, bears S. $0^{\circ} 31'$ W., 3.44 chs. dist.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, gravelly and rocky clay.

Timber, scattered Joshua trees; undergrowth, sagebrush, greasewood, and cacti.

General Description

The surface of this township is made up of a series of broken hills and ridges extending generally in the northeast-southwest direction, with intervening desert valleys with drainage leading mostly to the southwest. Elevations over the township vary between about 3500 and 5500 feet above sea level.

The soil on the hills and ridges is usually shallow and quite rocky. The valleys have light silt sandy soil and are cut by numerous washes.

The only timber found within the township consists of very thinly scattered Joshua and yucca trees. Undergrowth is generally low and scattered and consists mainly of sagebrush, greasewood, rabbit brush, bunch grass, and cacti.

A saline lake known as Lower Pahrana Lake straddles the west boundary of the township, extending into sections 30 and 31. Its water is unfit for irrigation or for stock watering purposes.

The area is used principally for winter stock range, winter being the only season of the year when stock water is usually available.

U. S. Highway No. 93 crosses the southwest corner of the township, running in the northwest-southeast direction from the west boundary of section 30 to just east of the corner of sections 32 and 33 on the south boundary. A power line and dirt road cross the township in the northeast-southwest direction from the east boundary of section 24 to the south boundary of section 34.
