

Independent Resurvey of the North Boundary of T. 15 S., R. 48 E.

Chains

- Over nearly level land, through heavy undergrowth.
- 25.00 Leave undergrowth; enter open area, edge bears NNE. and SSW.
- 40.00 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 6 and 31.
- Set an iron post, 36 ins. long, 1 in. diam., 30 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

- 45.00 Leave open area; enter scattered undergrowth, edge bears NNE. and SSW.

Soil, sandy and volcanic ash.

General Description

The general elevation of this township ranges from approximately 2400 feet above sea level in the south-central portion to 2600 feet in the northern portion. The entire township is nearly level with the exception of the north portion of secs. 1 and 2 which is gently rolling land covered with rocks. The soil is a fine sandy texture and volcanic loam. The township is covered with a fairly heavy growth of creosote bush and sagebrush with a sparse growth of native grasses.

There are no flowing streams or springs in the township. The Amargosa River, which is dry with the exception of certain periods during the rainy season of the year or after flash floods, enters the township from the northwest near the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 19 and 24, flows in a general south-southeast direction, and leaves the township about midpoint between the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 6 and 31 and the cor. of Ts. 15 and 16 S., Rs. 47 and 48 E.

An oiled road, U. S. Highway No. 95, enters the township from the east near the cor. of secs. 1, 6, 7 and 12, traverses in a general west-northwest direction, and leaves the township near the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 34 on the north boundary. An old graded road from Death Valley Junction to Beatty, Nevada enters the township from the south near the cor. of secs. 4, 5, 32 and 33, traverses in a general northwest direction, and leaves the township near the cor. of secs. 1, 6, 7 and 12 on the west boundary.

The old Tonopah and Tidewater Railroad grade, which has been dismantled, enters the township from the south near the cor. of secs. 5, 6, 31 and 32, traverses in a general northwest direction, and leaves the township near the cor. of secs. 13, 18, 19 and 24 on the west boundary.

There is a large sand mountain, visible for a number of miles, located approximately 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of the north boundary and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles east of the west boundary of this township.

There are no settlers living within the township.
