Chains

The south, west and east boundaries of T. 15 N., R. 44 E., Mount Diablo Meridian, were surveyed by Hatch, Barker and Bridges in 1873. Tracy surveyed the north boundary in 1867.

The following field notes are those of the remonumentation of certain identified original corners in T. 15 N., R. 44 E., Mount Diablo Meridian, Nevada. The position of each corner was marked by the original corner, or determined from corner accessories recorded in the original survey record.

The corners remonumented were selected by the U. S. Forest Service as being adjacent to, or controlling the boundaries of Forest Service Lands. The remonumentation was requested by and accomplished in cooperation with the Forest Service.

T. 15 N., R. 44 E., M.D. Mer., Nevada

The closing corner of Ts. 15 N., Rs. 43 and 44 E., on the 3rd Stan. Par. N., marked by a blue limestone, $22 \times 10 \times 5$ ins., marked with CC and 6 grooves on S. face, 6 notches on the E. and W. edges; firmly set in the ground, and witnessed by a mound of stone, $2 \times 1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. S. of cor.

At the cor. point

Set an iron post, 30 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, over broken glass deposit, and with the original cor. stone buried against N. side of post; with brass cap mkd.

Place collar of rock around post, and rebuild mound of stone S.

This closing cor. is W. $3.79\frac{1}{2}$ chs. (new measurement) from the SC of Ts. 16 N., Rs. 43 and 44 E.
