General Description

The general elevation of Township 7 South, Range 44 East ranges from about 4,000 ft. to about 4,500 ft. above sea level; the higher portion being on the east boundary, the remainder of the township falls in a wide valley which bears north and south. The soil is a mixture of sandy loam and clay except the eastern portion which is stony.

U. S. Highway No. 95 enters the township on the south boundary near the ½ sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 34, traversing through secs. 34, 33, 28 and 29, leaving sec. 29 on the north boundary near the ½ sec. cor. of secs. 20 and 29. A telephone line parallels the Highway. Nevada State Highway No. 72 enters the township on the south boundary near the ½ sec. cor. of secs. 6 and 31, traversing through secs. 31, 32, 29 and intersects U. S. Highway No. 95 in sec. 28.

There are three settlers in secs. 21, 28 and 34 who have small fields in cultivation, under irrigation with additional plots being leveled and will soon be in cultivation. The water is derived from wells located on the homesteads.

There is no timber in the township. The vegetation consists chiefly of sage and native bunch grasses of medium growth along the washes, in other areas of the township the vegetation is scattered.
