## General Description

Township 45 N., R. 65 E., is located in the mountainous area east of the town of Contact, Nevada. Trout Creek, a tributary of the Salmon River flows through the eastern half of the township. This stream in the late summer is dry throughout most of its length, but carries sufficient water for irrigation of the hay meadows of the Canyon Ranch located in part in secs. 26 and 35, at an elevation of approximately 5000 ft. This ranch is the only permanent settlement in the township and is located 14 miles from San Jacinto, Nevada, the nearest railroad point via a graded road. There are no other improved roads within the township.

From the valley along Trout Creek, rolling and rough mountains rise approximately 2000 ft. to the east and about 3000 ft. to the west. There is considerable scrub juniper along the slopes to the east of Trout Creek and along the lower half of the slopes to the west, of considerable value for fence posts and firewood. There
