#### General Description

This township is situated 10 to 20 miles to the southwest of Ely, Nevada in the range of desert hills and mountains lying along the east side of the south end of Jake's Valley. Most of the drainage from the area is to the south into the White River Basin.

The soil on the hills and mountainsides is generally sandy to gravelly and rocky in character, and the soil in the valleys is generally a fine light colored alkaline clay.

Undergrowth on the slopes generally consists of sagebrush, black brush and rabbit brush, and the valleys also frequently carry greasewood and shadscale. Cedar and pinon timber is found on the hills and mountains, but not in the valleys.

The area is chiefly valuable for stock grazing and a number of unimproved roads crisscross the area leading to stock water developments and campsites.
