Chains

- 20.00 Change to W. slope; desc. 50 ft. along same.
- 32.65 Foot of descent, bears E. and W.; asc. 390 ft. along general W. slope, to divide ridge.
- 40.00 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 5 and 6.
Set an iron post, 3 ft. long, 1 in. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, to bedrock, with brass cap mkd.

General Description, T. 22 N., R. 55 E.

Township 22 North, Range 55 East is situated about 80 miles NW. of Ely, Nevada, and 82 miles S. from Elko, Nevada. Through it traverses the graded highway from Ely to Elko, and the original ungraded road from Hamilton to Elko.

The land varies from the level bed of Alkali Lake, in the east, to rough mountainous land in the western portion of the township. Alkali Lake is a seasonably filled body of water, varying in depth from 1 to 6 feet, in the months of April, May, June, July and August. Separating the east and west drainages is a divide ridge, rising about 3,000 feet above Alkali Lake. It forms the boundary between White Pine and Eureka counties.

There is little or no soil suitable for agriculture; what little there is is a sandy alkaline clay, which may be found extending about one mile east from the Elko-Ely highway. Between this land and the West shore of Alkali Lake, the country is marshy, with deep sloughs draining toward Alkali Lake.

Some widely scattering timber, notably mountain mahogany, juniper, and scrub pine, is found in the western part of the township, together with scattering mountain laurel and sagebrush. In the less mountainous sections, there is a scattered growth of sagebrush, varying in height from 1 to 3 feet.

The township is suitable for sheep grazing.

There is one settler, Mr. Pete Giocoechea, in section 11; there are uninhabited ranch buildings in section 2 and 34.
