GENERAL DESCRIPTION The area within the west 4 ranges of sections of T. 42 N., R.25 E. is rolling mountainous, of a general elevation of approximately 6000 ft. above sea level. There is very little timber within the township, none of commercial importance. Some clumps of scrub mountain mahogany are sufficiently large to provide a small amount of firewood. The entire area is covered with a very good growth of bunch grass. The only water available the year around is from a spring located near the center of the NW_4^1 of sec. 29, at which a group of watering troughs has been installed. The large amount of grass remaining in the fall of the year indicated that the number of livestock which can be profitably grazed upon this area is limited by the amount of water available rather than by the amount of forage. The road from Summit Lake to Vya, Nevada, which at one time in the past had been graded, passes through the extreme northeast part of the area (Sec. 3). There was no habitation within the township at the time of the survey. The area is extremely isolated, being located approximately 70 miles from Cedarville, California, 50 miles from Denio, Oregon and 80 miles from Gerlach, Nevada, with only primitive roads to any of these places.
