

INDEPENDENT RESURVEY OF THE EAST BOUNDARY
T. 20 N., R. 62 E.

CHAINS

From point of intersection the standard cor. of secs. 34 and 35, T. 21 N., R. 62 E., bears West, 24.89 chs. dist., and is monumented with an iron post, 2½ ins. diam., firmly set in the ground, marked and witnessed as described in the field notes of the concurrent resurvey of the Fourth Standard Parallel North through R. 62 E.

Land, heavily rolling mountainous.
Soil, sandy and gravelly clay loam, rocky.
Timber, juniper and pinon; undergrowth, sagebrush.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land along these lines lie in the Steptoe valley and along the Egan range of mountains. The elevation ranges from about 6,000 feet to 8,100 feet above sea level.

The soil is sandy and gravelly clay loam, alkaline, in the valley lands, and a sandy and gravelly clay loam rocky along the west side where it is gently rolling. There is a fair growth of native grasses on the valley lands and there is a medium heavy growth of sagebrush on the gently rolling land. The land is used primarily by cattlemen.

There are no settlers in the township at the present time but there are indications that some of the land will be put into production in the very near future. There are indications of minerals in the western portion of the area. Access into the area is by semi-improved roads that traverse through the western portion of the township.

Duck Creek, enters the township from the south and flows northerly through the eastern portion of the township.
