CHAINS	<p>bury the original cornerstone alongside the iron post, and raise a mound of stone, 4 ft. base, 2½ ft. high, S. of cor.</p> <p>The geographic position of this corner is latitude 40° 04' 37.390" N. and longitude 114° 47' 16.970" W. as determined by the tellurometer survey for the protraction survey, under Group No. 389.</p> <p>From this corner, the standard corner of secs 31 and 32, T. 26 N., R. 64 E., monumented with a limestone, 16x14x10 ins., firmly set in the ground, marked and witnessed as described in the official record, bears N. 89° 55' E., 0.72 chs. dist.</p> <p>From this same corner the standard corner of T. 26 N., Rs. 63 and 64 E., monumented with a limestone, 16x12x3 ins., firmly set in the ground and marked as described in the official record, bears S. 89° 55' W., 79.80 chs. dist.</p> <p>No trace of the standard ¼ sec. cor. of sec. 31, T. 26 N., R. 64 E., could be found.</p> <p>Land, southern portion, gently rolling; northern portion rough mountainous. Soil, sandy and gravelly, stony. Timber, pinon and juniper; undergrowth, sagebrush.</p> <hr/> <p style="text-align: center;">GENERAL DESCRIPTION</p> <hr/> <p>The land in this portion of Township 25 North, Range 63 E., is nearly level land, and is located in the northern portion of Steptoe Valley between the Schell Creek and Cherry Creek range of mountains. The greater portion of the township lies in the Cherry Creek range of mountains and the elevation ranges from about 6100 feet in the valley to 8,500 feet in the Cherry Creek range of mountains which are extremely rough and covered with a good growth of timber.</p> <p>The soil varies from sandy and gravelly alkaline clay loam in the valley to sandy and gravelly and stony in the mountains.</p> <p>The vegetation consists of native grasses in the valleys along the drainages with sagebrush and rabbit brush throughout the township.</p> <p>The area is drained by Duck Creek for the eastern portion of the township which flows northerly through the valley.</p> <p>Principal users of the area are cattlemen and access into the township is provided by an oiled road as well as other improved roads. There are also a few miners in the area who have developed small mining claims as there is evidence of minerals in the Cherry Creek range of mountains.</p>	
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
