## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within Township 42 North, Range 35 East varies from high rolling in the eastern portion to mountainous in the central western portion (in which the Double H Mountains traverse), to nearly level land in the western portion. The elevation ranges from about 4,100 to 5,900 ft. above sea level. The soil varies from sandy to sandy loam, and is rocky in the higher elevations. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, shadscale, greasewood, and sparse native grasses.

The eastern portion of the township drains easterly into the Quinn River. The southwestern portion is also drained by the Quinn River, which crosses sec. 31. The northwestern portion drains into the King's River, which is a tributary of the Quinn River. No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.

Principal users of the area are cattlemen, and access into the township is provided by desert roads.
