X BT.</p><p>No other suitable bearing trees were available.</p><p>The S. ¼ sec. cor. of sec. 34, T. 19 N., R. 36 E., bears S. 89° 59' W., 8.50 chs. dist.</p></div> <div><div>GENERAL DESCRIPTION</div><div><p>Township 18 North, Range 36 East is situated about 60 miles east of Fallon, Nevada. The terrain surveyed within the township varies from mountainous in the northern portion known as the Clan Alpine Mountains to rolling and gently rolling in the remaining portion. The elevation ranges from about 5,200 to 7,000 ft. above sea level. The soil is sandy clay loam, with rocky areas on the higher elevations. The timber is composed of scattered juniper and pinon on the higher elevations. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, shadscale, budsage and sparse native grasses.</p><p>The land surveyed is drained by numerous drainages connecting with Camp Creek, which drains south-southeasterly across the township. The new proposed route for U. S. Highway No. 50, under construction, crosses the extreme southeastern portion of sec. 36. Further access into the township is provided by trail roads. No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.</p><p>Principal users of the area are cattlemen. There are no settlements within the township.</p></div></div>
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
