

DEPENDENT RESURVEY OF A PORTION OF THE SUBDIVISION,
T. 29 N., R. 43 E.

CHAINS

- 40.15 Point for the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 2, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.
- Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

- set a steel fence post, $5\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. in the ground alongside the iron post.
- 60.20 Fence, bears W. and E. 0.45 chs. dist. to corner of fences bearing W. and N.
- 80.13 The cor. of secs. 1, 2, 35 and 36, on the N. bdy. of the Tp., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of T. 30 N., R. 43 E. resurveyed concurrently under this same Group.
- Land, nearly level.
Soil, sandy loam.
Undergrowth, shadscale, greasewood, sagebrush and budsage.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within the portion of Township 29 North, Range 43 East resurveyed herein, ranges from about 4,640 to 4,760 feet above sea level and is nearly level. The soil is sandy clay loam and gravel. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, shadscale, greasewood, budsage and sparse native grasses.

The township is drained by the Reese River that enters the township in Section 35 and leaves in Section 3; the river is a dry channel throughout most of the summer months. There is a ranch house located in Section 12. There is cultivated land in parts of Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, and 14. No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.

Principal users of the area are cattlemen, sheepmen and farmers. Access is provided by graded gravel and trail roads throughout the township.
