

SURVEY OF THE SUBDIVISIONAL LINES OF T. 29 N., R. 44 $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

CHAINS

From this same corner, the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 7, T. 29 N., R. 45 E., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of the W. bdy. of T. 29 N., R. 45 E., resurveyed concurrently under this same Group, bears S. $0^{\circ} 16'$ W., 5.07 chs. dist.

The point for the E. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 1, on the W. bdy. of T. 29 N., R. 45 E., and due EAST of the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 1, Tps. 29 N., Rs. 44 and $44\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

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set a steel fence post, $5\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. in the ground alongside the iron post.

From this corner, the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 1, Tps. 29 N., Rs. 44 and $44\frac{1}{2}$ E., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of T. 29 N., R. 44 E., resurveyed concurrently under this same Group, bears WEST, 2.06 chs. dist.

From this same corner, the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 6, T. 29 N., R. 45 E., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of the W. bdy. of T. 29 N., R. 45 E., resurveyed concurrently under this same Group, bears S. $0^{\circ} 15'$ W., 4.52 chs. dist.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within township 29 North, Range $44\frac{1}{2}$ East, ranges from about 5,000 to 6,200 ft. above sea level. The northern part is rolling and the southern part is mountainous. The soil is sandy gravel and rocky in the higher elevations and sandy gravel in the lower elevations. There are juniper and pinon in the mountains. The vegetation consists of shadscale, budsage, sagebrush and sparse native grasses.

Trout Creek enters and leaves the township in section 12. There has been some mineral activity in the township.

Principal users of the area are cattlemen, sheepmen and farmers. There is a small plot of alfalfa in sections 12 and 13. Access into the township is provided by graded gravel roads and trail roads scattered throughout the township.
