

DEPENDENT RESURVEY OF THE SUBDIVISIONAL LINES,
T. 30 N., R. 60 E.

CHAINS

Land, nearly level.
Soil, sandy clay loam.
Undergrowth, greasewood and meadowgrass.

The point for the N. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 5, on the Sixth Standard Parallel North and at midpoint on the N. bdy. of sec. 5.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

raise a mound of stone, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. base, 2 ft. high, S. of cor.

From this corner, the standard $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 32, bears S. $89^{\circ} 34'$ E., 16.275 chs. dist., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of the resurvey of the Sixth Standard Parallel North, through R. 60 E., executed under this same Group.

The point for the N. $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 6, on the Sixth Standard Parallel North and at proportionate distance on the N. bdy. of sec. 6.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

From this corner, the standard $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 31, bears S. $89^{\circ} 47'$ E., 15.98 chs. dist., monumented with an iron post, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of the resurvey of the Sixth Standard Parallel North, through R. 60 E., executed under this same Group.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within Township 30 North, Range 60 East, is nearly level valley land. The average elevation is about 6,000 ft. above sea level. The soil is sandy clay with some traces of alkali in the western portion of the township. There is no timber. The vegetation consists mainly of sagebrush, rabbitbrush, greasewood and sparse native grasses.

The township is drained by Franklin River, which drains southerly through the northwest portion of the township. No mineral formations were noted during the survey.

Principal users of the area are stockmen, and access into the township is provided by desert roads.
