There is no spiral data shown--only the single circular curve data.

Not included in the reconveyance of sec. 5 is a rectangular area 100 feet wide extending easterly along the southerly R/W of the W.P.R.R., 500 ft. from Station 445+00., containing 1.15 acres.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within Township 36 North, Range 39 East, ranges from about 7280 feet in the mountains to about 4320 feet along the river bottom. The soil is sandy clay and rocky in the mountains and sandy clay loam along the river bottom. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, shadscale, crested wheat grass, and wild meadow grasses, with willows along the Humboldt River.

The entire township is drained by the Humboldt River, which crosses through the northern part of the township on a winding westerly course.

Several ranches and farms are located in the township and the area is used chiefly for stock raising and farming. No mineral formations of consequence were noted during this survey.

U.S. Interstate No. 80, and the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific Railroads, cross the township. Other access into the township is provided by graded gravel roads and trail roads.
