DEPENDENT RESURVEY OF THE NORTH BOUNDARY OF T. 42 N., R. 20 E.

The cor. of Tps. 42 and 43 N., Rs. 19 and 20 E., monumented with a juniper post, 3 ins. diam., $3\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long, badly weathered, no legible marks, lying on a small mound of earth. The record calls for a stone monument. This point is accepted as the best remaining evidence of the position of the original corner.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

deposit the juniper post and set a steel fence post 6 ft. long, 18 ins. in the ground alongside the iron post.

From this corner, the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 31 and 36, T. 43 N., Rs. 19 and 20 E., bears N. 2° 37' E., 41.13 chs. dist., monumented with a mound of well imbedded stone, no mkd. stone found. I rehabilitate this monument.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This boundary is situated in the eastern portion of Long Valley, about 7 miles east of Vya, Nevada. Access is provided by Nevada State Route 8A and several trail róads.

The terrain varies from nearly level to mountainous. Elevation varies from 5550 to 5850 feet above sea level. The soil ranges from a sandy clay to rocky alluvium. Vegetation is comprised of sagebrush, greasewood and rabbitbrush, with a mixed variety of grasses in the reseeded area.

No water nor mineral sources were noted during the survey. There are no residents in the area adjacent to the boundary.

Principal users of the area are stockmen.
