

SURVEY OF THE SOUTH BOUNDARY OF T. 14 N., R. 55 E.

<div>CHAINS</div>	<div><div><div>58.00</div><div>Wash, 15 lks. wide, 2 ft. deep, drains SE.</div></div><div><div>58.80</div><div>Wash, 15 lks. wide, 2 ft. deep, drains S.</div></div><div><div>61.40</div><div>Wash, 10 lks. wide, 2 ft. deep, drains S.</div></div><div><div>64.87</div><div><div>The SE. cor. of T. 14 N., R. 55 E., monumented with an iron post, 2½ ins. diam., set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the field notes of the independent resurvey of the W. bdy. of T. 14 N., R. 56 E., surveyed concurrently under this same Group.</div><div>Land, gently rolling.</div><div>Soil, sandy clay and gravel.</div><div>Undergrowth, sagebrush and greasewood.</div></div></div><div><div>GENERAL DESCRIPTION</div><div><div>The area surveyed along the south boundaries of Township 14 North, Ranges 53, 54 and 55 East, varies from gently rolling to mountainous land, which crosses the Pancake Mountain Range, from Little Smokey Valley to Railroad Valley. The elevation ranges from about 5700 to 8600 ft. above sea level. The vegetation consists of sagebrush and greasewood; the timber is comprised of juniper, pinon and mahogany. The soil is sandy clay, gravelly and rocky.</div><div>The area surveyed drains west to north-west into Little Smokey Valley and east to south-east into Railroad Valley. No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.</div><div>Access into the area is provided by Nevada State Highway No. 20, an improved gravel road, which crosses T. 14 N., R. 55 E., in a northwesterly direction and supplemented by numerous trail roads.</div><div>Principal users of the area are cattlemen.</div></div></div></div>
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
