Undergrowth, whitesage, budsage and shadscale.</p> <hr/> <p style="text-align: center;">GENERAL DESCRIPTION</p> <p>The land within Township 29 North, Range 68 East, ranges from about 5,600 to 9,000 ft. above sea level, and is nearly level to mountainous. The Goshute Range of mountains extends into the east half of the township. The remainder of the township is in Antelope Valley. The soil is sandy clay to gravelly in the lower elevation and sandy clay and rocky in the higher elevation. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, whitesage and budsage in the valley, and fir, juniper, pinon, mountain mahogany and native bunchgrass in the mountains.</p> <p>The township is drained by minor dry washes draining east and west into the valleys.</p> <p>No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.</p> <p>Principal users of the area are cattlemen. Access into the township is provided by U.S. Highway Alternate 50, which crosses through the southeast portion of the township. A trail road crosses through the township from section 34 to section 6.</p>
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
