| | GENERAL DESCRIPTION |
| | The area surveyed within Township 19 North, Range 45 East, varies from mountainous in the north and east to rolling hills in the southwest, nearly level meadow land. The elevation ranges from about 6,300 to 7,000 ft. above sea level. The soil varies from sandy clay loam and rocky on the higher elevations to black loam on the lower elevations. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, grass, juniper and pinon pine. There are scattered stands of willows and cottonwood along Willow Creek and in Simpson Park Canyon. |
| | Willow Creek crosses through section 18, and cuts across the SW. cor. of section 7, draining SE. There is a well and corral on the east boundary of section 7. |
