

DEPENDENT RESURVEY OF A PORTION OF THE EAST BOUNDARY,
T. 27 N., R. 56 E., MDM, NEVADA

CHAINS 37.60	Brown Creek, 10 lks. wide, 6 ins. deep, course W.
38.30	Forest Service trail, bears E. and W.
38.81	Intersect the original S. bdy. of sec. 36, T. 28 N., R. 56 E. Point for the NE. closing cor. of sec. 1, T. 27 N., R. 56 E., at proportionate distance; based upon the re-tracement in 1944 under Group No. 191; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner. Set an aluminum post, 30 ins. long, 2½ ins. diam., 12 ins. in the ground to bedrock and in a mound of stone cap, 4 ft. base, with aluminum cap mkd. T28N R57E S 31 S 1 T27N R56E C C 1981 From this corner, an amended monument, monumented with an iron post, 3 ins. diam., in a mound of stone to cap, 4 ft. base, with brass cap mkd. as described in the field notes of the dependent resurvey of the S. bdy. of T. 28 N., R. 56 E., executed concurrently under this same Group, bears N. 89° 50' E., 5.23 chs. dist.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land within Township 27 North, Range 56 East, ranges from about 5800 to 8000 ft. above sea level, the eastern portion of the township is located on the western slope of the Ruby Mountains, the remainder lies in Huntington Valley.

The soil consists of sandy loam in the valley and a gravelly clay with rock outcropping in the mountains.

There are scattered juniper, pinon, mahogany and aspen on the higher elevations.

The vegetation consists of sagebrush, rabbitbrush, native grass, with willows and wild rose bushes along the creeks.

Principal users of the area are cattlemen and access into the township is provided by improved and unimproved roads.
